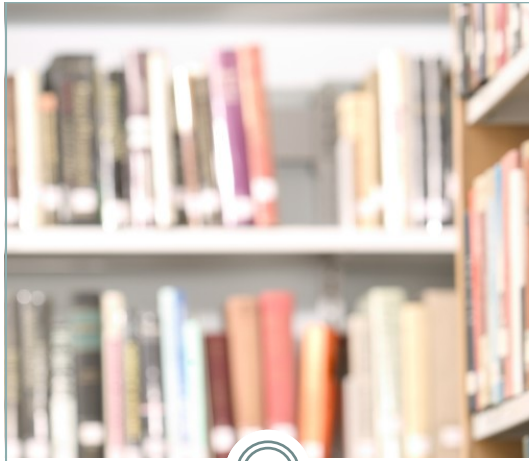

Robert Hayes —

Marijuana Legalization: Lessons Learned

Robert Hayes is the Western Region Project Manager for the Drug Evaluation Classification program and employed by the International Association of Chiefs of Police. In 2022, Robert retired as a Patrol Lieutenant with the Albany Police Department after 32 years in law enforcement. Robert is currently a Drug Recognition Expert, Drug Recognition Expert Instructor, Standard Field Sobriety Test Instructor, and a crash reconstructionist. He also teaches at the Department of Public Safety Standards and Training (Oregon Police Academy), as a part-time instructor. Robert Hayes will provide lessons learned from Oregon and other states that have legalized marijuana, and the impact legalization has had on Youth Prevention efforts in those states.

- Discuss CBD, Delta 8, and Delta 10, and acquire the skills to recognize the differences between these products
- Outline pitfalls that states which already legalized marijuana have encountered, as well as the consequences those states encountered in their communities
