ABOUT THE PRESENTERS

Justin W. Patchin, Ph.D., is a professor of Criminal Justice at the University of Wisconsin-Eau Claire. He received his Ph.D. in Criminal Justice from Michigan State University. Since 2002 he has been exploring the intersection of teens and technology, with particular focus on cyberbullying, social networking, and sexting. He has traveled around the country (and abroad) training educators, counselors, law enforcement officers, parents, and youth on how to prevent the misuse of technology. Dr. Patchin is co-director of the Cyberbullying Research Center (www.cyberbullying.org) and has written eight books and numerous academic and professional articles on adolescent behaviors online. His first co-authored book: "Bullying beyond the Schoolyard: Preventing and Responding to Cyberbullying" was named Education Book of the Year in 2009 by ForeWord Reviews. In 2014 he wrote "Words Wound: Delete Cyberbullying and Make Kindness Go Viral" to help teens navigate online problems. His latest book: "Bullying Today: Bullet Points and Best Practices" came out in 2016. He has presented at the White House and the FBI Academy and has appeared on CNN, NPR, and in the New York Times to discuss the issues associated with teens use and misuse of technology.

Becky Wacker is the Founder and Director of a social media marketing company, The Social B. Becky is a social media specialist, consultant and public speaker. Becky has done public speaking on Social Media Safety for over 8 years across Nebraska. Churches, schools, parent and teen groups, youth groups and more have utilized her services. ABOUT THE PRESENTERS

Abbe Edgecombe joined SCIP in July, 2015. She coordinates SCIP for schools in Lincoln and Lancaster County. Abbe received her Bachelor of Science Degree in Human Development and Family Relationships from the University of Nebraska at Kearney, and completed her Master's Degree in Family and Community service at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln in 2016. Prior to joining SCIP, Abbe worked for 13 years for another program of Lincoln Medical Education Partnership, Stepping Stones for Families, where she worked in the field of adult substance use, family support/advocacy, and community outreach. Abbe speaks on a variety of topics within our schools and community regarding youth behavioral health, including Youth Substance Use Trends, Mental Health Awareness and Digital Citizenship.

Dr. Douglas Gentile is an award-winning research scientist, educator, author, and is professor of developmental psychology at Iowa State University. His experience includes over 30 years conducting research with children and adults. He is the editor of the book *Media Violence and Children* (2 editions; Praeger Press), and co-author of the book *Violent Video Game Effects on Children and Adolescents: Theory, Research, and Public Policy* (2007, Oxford University Press). He has authored over 100 peer-reviewed scientific journal articles, including studies on the positive and negative effects of video games on children in several countries, the validity of the American media ratings, how screen time contributes to youth obesity, and what is being called video game and Internet "addiction." In 2010, he was honored with the Distinguished Scientific Contributions to Media Psychology Award from the American Psychological Association (Division 46). He was named one of the Top 300 Professors in the United States by the Princeton Review.
